~ Choices, Choices! ~ How Do You Pick the Perfect Apple?

So many apples... so hard to choose a favorite. Shiny red Galas. Pale green Granny Smiths. Yellow Delicious.

Look past the color, to your planned use: Apples for pies. Apples for eating. Apples for sauce. Apples to store away into the winter months.

Everyone seems to know an apple they consider the "best." With so many choices, autumn is a special time in Johnny Appleseed's back yard. Fruit hangs heavy on the trees, and families head into the orchards to enjoy the bounty of the season. Consider this: The Red Apple Farm in Phillipston offers 42 different varieties of the fruit that earned Johnny Appleseed his nickname! And a single tree in their orchard sports 100 different varieties of apples on its grafted branches.

Cream of the Crop

Sholan Farms, a 169-acre orchard operated by a volunteer organization, has more than three dozen varieties ripening from mid-August till late October. But the Friends of Sholan Farms celebrate the "Cream of the Crop" — their Macouns — in late September. It's a great weekend to visit and see all that Sholan has to offer.

But you don't have to wait for a special event to visit a "youpick" spot like Hollis Hills Farm in Fitchburg, Meadowbrook Orchards in Sterling, or Carlson Orchards in Harvard. Apple season begins in July and runs right through October, so there's always something great to pick. Many orchards and farmstands also have climatecontrolled storage, so you can keep coming back for more, even after



the pick-your-own season is past.

The hardest part might be deciding just what to take home! Every orchard or farmstand has its own specialties — and you'll often find home-baked pies, freshpressed cider and other apple delights at these local markets, too.

Recognizing the desire for family

outings, many growers, like Lanni Orchards in Lunenburg, turn apple season into festival season as well — with music, hayrides, pie-baking contests and more.

So fill your basket, tour the fields, savor the flavors, and enjoy your adventure in Johnny Appleseed's backyard. §

Apple-icious

Ideas

Sourchards and filled baskets or bags of luscious-looking (and tasting) fruits. Now comes the question: What are you going to do with them all?

Of course, the family will be biting right into some — maybe before you even get home. Some will sit in a bowl on the table, providing tasteful autumn décor for your kitchen, a reminder of your country tour.

And then ... what? We have the answer for you! Here are a pair of recipes from local chefs to help you turn those fabulous fruits into tasty tidbits to tempt your palate. Don your apron, get out your favorite mixing bowl, and enjoy! §

APPLE RAISIN NUT BREAD



A moist and delicious quick bread that you can make with fresh apples!

Ingredients:

4 eggs

1 1/4 cups vegetable oil

1 tablespoon vanilla

3 cups chopped apples

2/3 cup raisins

1/2 cup chopped walnuts

2 ½ cups sugar

3 cups flour

2 teaspoons cinnamon

1 ½ teaspoons salt

1 ½ teaspoons baking soda

1/2 teaspoon cloves

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

Preheat oven to 350.

Grease and flour two loaf pans.

In a large bowl, add chopped apples, sugar, eggs, oil, vanilla, raisins, and nuts. Stir well.

In a separate bowl, mix dry ingredients together well.

Add dry ingredients slowly to wet ingredients. Mix them just until there are no dry ingredients visible. Don't overmix. Pour batter into two greased loaf pans. Bake until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

Cool in pan for about 10 minutes, remove from pan to finish cooling on a rack.

HOT & CRISPY CINNAMON APPLE EGGROLL WITH APPLE PIE ICE CREAM

Cinnamon Apple Eggrolls

Serves 6-8

Filling:

Sauté together approximately 10 minutes 4 cups diced peeled Honeycrisp Apples 1 cup granulated sugar

1 tablespoon lemon zest Juice of 1/2 lemon

2 tablespoons unsalted butter

Mix all to a paste, add to above while a slow boil until thickened, set aside to cool

2 tablespoons cornstarch 1 tablespoons cinnamon

1/2 cup cold water

Assemble:

8 Nasoya Eggroll Wrappers

1 large egg

Separate wrappers and lay out flat Brush with beaten egg.

Divide apple filling amongst wrappers, fold corners in and roll up tightly. Fry Eggrolls till golden, drain on paper

towels, then roll in cinnamon sugar.

To Serve:

Slice Hot Cinnamon Apple Eggroll at a bias, lay over Scoop of Apple Pie Ice Cream, drizzle with Caramel Sauce & Fireball Whiskey.

h, there's nothing quite like the crisp air of fall in New England — cool, clean, with just a hint of ... garlic?

Yes, folks, it's time to follow your nose to Forster's Farm on Chestnut Hill Road in Orange, where garlic reigns over a weekend of food, fun, art and environmental awareness. The North Quabbin Garlic & Arts Festival, celebrating a quarter century of aromatic enjoyment this year, is a staple of autumn in North Central Massachusetts.

Popularly known as the "Festival that Stinks," Garlic & Arts is a fabulous family-friendly destination held just as fall foliage sets area hillsides ablaze in color. Visitors to the historic farm can wander among 100 exhibitors showcasing captivating creativity, farm-fresh products, and healing arts.

Three stages provide a perfect backdrop, with music, performance, and spoken word throughout the weekend. You can take a world tour of glorious garlic cuisine and chef demonstrations. Want more? There are over 50 workshops and talks on topics ranging from Foraging for Mushrooms to Getting Pumped about Heat Pumps, and Improving Habitats for Honeybees and Pollinators. How about spending time in the free kids' art-making tent, or trying your hand at garlic games — including the famous (or infamous) garlic-eating contest?

Despite its name, this festival isn't just about

fragrant food! "Orange is the new green at the festival," its organizers say, with its local living workshops and a host of electric vehicles on display. Just how "green" is this weekend event? Would you believe that despite all the food, fun, and frivolity, the festival produces only two bags of trash for 8,000 people?

After a brief hiatus due to the Covid pandemic, the festival has come back stronger (and more fragrant) than ever. "Twenty five years ago," the organizers say, "we dreamed up an idea to celebrate the beauty and bounty of our region, so oftenoverlooked, and ignite the cultural and agricultural economy of the North Quabbin. Today, more than ever, people of all walks of life need places to come together in celebration and gain inspiration for resilient lives and communities, and a saner world." That's just what you'll find at the Festival.

The flavorful event runs from 10 am to 5 pm on September 30 and October 1, offering ample time to enjoy a taste of the region. As a twentyfifth anniversary special, Garlic & Arts is offering half-price general admission this year — only \$5 for the weekend! Kids 12 and under are admitted free. Card to Culture: EBT, WIC, and ConnectorCare cardholders can also attend free of charge. Visit www.garlicandarts.org for the full array of vendors, performance and workshops, parking and shuttle information. (No pets, service animals only.) 

Celebrate the Season!



The lazy, hazy days of summer are winding down, and the crisp, invigorating weeks of winter lie ahead. As autumn arrives in all its brilliant glory, the agricultural past and recreational present combine to make Johnny Appleseed Country a daily delight.

As you travel through North Central Massachusetts, you can see scores of active farms and orchards, providing both food and entertainment for today's residents and visitors. You can swing by a farmstand to pick up some fresh veggies for your dinner table, or spend a day picking shiny red, green, even golden apples in a sunny hilltop orchard.

But fall is also a time for folks to gather together to celebrate this

bounty — and the region provides weeks of festivals to make that possible!

Tracing Our Roots

There's no surer place to see the area's agricultural roots than at the Sterling Fair — a two and a half day, family oriented, community, agricultural fair with the emphasis on agriculture and education. The Sterling Fair features rides, horse pulls, oxen pulls, tractor pulls, helicopter rides, antique engine and machinery show, livestock shows, food, entertainment and more!

The fair begins on Friday, September 8, with a fun-packed midway — fun, food, games, thrilling rides (like the iconic Ferris wheel), all designed to get you in a festive mood. But don't let the bright lights, chills, and thrills fool you. This is a weekend packed with everything from a kids' frog jumping contest and women's skillet-tossing contest to an antique tractor and engine show! Horse and oxen pulls. Baked goods and quilting contests. Vegetable and gourd decorating shows. And music, music! Learn more about this weekend-long event at sterlingfair.org.

Tons of Pumpkins

If you love pumpkins — and who doesn't, at this time of year! — be sure to swing by the Ashby Pumpkin Festival on the Ashby Town Common on September 30. It's a celebration of that popular fall favorite complete with food, music, and even a tractor parade!

Of course, you can find lots of pumpkins at local farms and fairs — pumpkins to make into pies; tiny pumpkins to decorate your dinner table; orange (and white!), round, and oval pumpkins to carve into Halloween jack-o-lanterns.

But wait! You haven't seen pumpkins until you've visited the Pumpkin Weigh-In on Columbus Day weekend at the Red Apple Farm in Phillipston. These are really, really, really big pumpkins. These babies can tip the scales at over a thousand pounds!

This annual event celebrating these giant gourds, and the region's agricultural history, is planned for Sunday, October 8 this year. It's a sight you won't want to miss!

The Apple of Your Eye

Did you know that the Macoun is considered the "cream of the crop" at Sholan Farms, the last working orchard in Johnny Appleseed's home town? Run by a dedicated group of volunteers, Sholan Farms is a great spot to visit year-round — but it really shines in late summer and early fall, when apple lovers flock to the orchard and farm stand.

Of course, apple picking season is a reason to celebrate everything apple! Plan to visit this hilltop orchard overlooking the city on September 16 and 17, for Honeycrisp Weekend, and September 23 and 24 for Cream of the Crop Weekend, and be sure to come back on October 7 for the Scarecrows in the Orchard Harvest Festival!

Love mountain views? Visit Wachusett Mountain Ski Area's twoweekend long AppleFest, featuring "everything apple," including a



pie-eating contest, along with music, clowns, inflatables, food trucks and more!

And speaking of Johnny Appleseed ... you won't want to miss the Appleseed Country Fair, a three-day extravaganza at the Red Apple Farm in Phillipston on Labor Day weekend! Keep your eyes peeled — you just might spot Johnny himself amid the fair-goers! The weekend is jam-packed with music, crafters, hayrides, farm animals ... and the ever-popular brew barn! Pick your own apples, or buy some at the farm store, bring the family and enjoy a day in the fresh country air!

The region's namesake also lends his moniker to a downtown Leominster bash — the Johnny Appleseed Arts & Cultural Festival, a day filled with food, music, and more right in the city's business district. Visit over 220 Vendors From School Street to Park Street and West Street, and onto Main Street to Merriam Avenue. The world famous

Apple Crisp returns, as does Johnny Appleseed himself!

But Wait! There's More!

Pick a weekend, any weekend, in the fall, and you're likely to find a celebration somewhere in Johnny Appleseed Country. Here's a quick list to get your plans moving: St. Edward's Fall Fair in Westminster; ShirleyFest on the Shirley Common; River City Rhythm & Rock Fest in Fitchburg; Winchendon's Fall Festival, held downtown: the Westminster Cracker Barrel Festival; the 42nd Arts & Crafts Fair on Townsend Common; BBQFest at Wachusett Mountain Ski Area; the Alpaca Farm Fest in Lunenburg; the Garlic & Arts Festival in Orange (see story on page 8); and the Cannoli Festival in Leominster!

There's just no shortage of celebrations this fall — browse through the Calendar section of this Guide and head out for a fun- (and food-) filled day in Johnny's backyard. §



100 Years... and Counting





f you love parades, you're in for a treat in September, as the City of Gardner celebrates a major milestone!

Settled in 1764, and designated as a town in 1785, this North Central Massachusetts community grew and blossomed — gaining fame as "The Chair City" in recognition of its manufacturing base — and in 1923 made the leap to incorporation as a city. That transformation is the subject of a year-long celebration, with special events that began in January and will run right through the end of the calendar year.

The festivities have included a flashback dance, essay contests, and a summer gathering that encompassed everything from kids' activities to food trucks and music. The Gardner Museum hosted a special exhibition through the summer, "Celebrating Gardner's 100 Years as a City," showcasing memorable aspects of the City's first 100 years. Highlighted in that exhibition were long-term businesses

that continue to serve the Chair City today.

The highlight of the party, though, will be on Sunday, September 17 — a two-mile long Centennial Parade through the center of the city. According to the Centennial Committee, even the parade route has meaning: It begins on Elm Street, where Gardner's Giant Chair is located, and passes by the Gardner Museum on Pearl Street (a repository of Gardner's history from its earliest settlement in 1764) and continues down Central Street near Monument Park — now known as the venue of popular summer concerts. The route continues through Gardner's iconic downtown and ends on Waterford Street, where a new community center will open as the city begins its second century.

The year-long Centennial party wraps up in December with a gala ball in City Hall.

Want to know more about this centennial city? Check out its Facebook page, 100Gardner, for a day-by-day look at the community,



spotlighting people, places and events like the 1925 opening of the J. J. Newberry store on Parker Street, the date in 1935 when Gardner regained bragging rights as the home to the largest chair in the world (a 16-foot tall Colonial Hitchcock chair made by the Heywood Wakefield Company for Gardner's sesquicentennial), the Gardner High School hockey team's capture of the state championship in 1994, and the 2015 dedication of the new Police Station on Main Street — featuring an entryway that reflects the city's "Chair City" designation.

Ready for a once-in-a-hundredyears party? Gardner is the place to be in '23! §

Love animals? Dress the kids in their costumes and stop by In the Meadow Farm in Lunenburg on October 29 for an afternoon filled with games, prizes, family fun — and alpacas!

Or swing by Wachusett Mountain Ski Area on October 28 for its one-day BooFest. Enjoy a spookishly fun day, with festive contests, ghoulish treats and eccentric entertainment for the whole family!

Terrifying (or Not) Tours

While you're enjoying some quality time with the family, hop in the car and take a tour of Halloween decorations, from tacky to terrifying, throughout Leominster. 

Fon the Binds

ave you seen any Northern cardinals lately? Redbellied woodpeckers? Carolina wrens? Purple finches?

If you enjoy bird-watching, you won't want to miss participating in the annual Audubon Christmas Bird Count — an event that's been going on for more than a century. During a three-week period from December 14, 2023 to January 5, 2024, tens of thousands of birders will head outside in a cooperative effort to get the best count of birds throughout the country — and beyond.

A Circle of Friends

While bird-watching is often a solitary activity enjoyed in peaceful surroundings, the Christmas Bird Count is truly a group event, with participants counting birds on a single day within defined 15-mile diameter "circles." Locally, active CBC circles are located in Athol, Westminster and the Oxbow area in Harvard. (You can find contact information for each of those circles online at audubon. maps.arcgis.com.) To participate in the CBC, you need to join an existing CBC circle by contacting the compiler (leader) in advance of the count day.

If you live within the boundaries of a CBC circle, you can stay at home

and report the birds that visit your feeder on count day, as long as you have made prior arrangement with the count compiler.

New to the Christmas Bird Count world? Don't worry! Birders of all skill sets are involved in the CBC. If you're a beginning birder, the local circle's compiler will pair you with an expert initially to ensure a proper count.

As you can see, this is a serious, well-controlled study, and CBC data have been used in hundreds of analyses, peer-reviewed publications, and government reports over the decades. A total of 133 Christmas Bird Counts were conducted in New England during the 122nd CBC season last winter. The "work force" participating in this effort included 4,071 counters (not including feeder watchers) who managed to tally 213 species!

Not on Your Calendar?

If you can't make it to an active count circle — but still want to help keep track of local bird populations — you're in luck!

As an alternative, you may be interested in joining in the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) organized by Audubon, the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Birds Canada. It takes place President's Day weekend each February, and you can count the birds each day in your backyard /community and then enter the results online.

And each fall and spring bring additional watchful experiences: The Eastern Mass Hawkwatch, when spotters gather to watch the movement of raptors unfold in the seasonal migrations. In Spring 2023, Eastern Mass Hawk Watch

(EMHW) spotters counted over 2,300 migrating raptors (along with numerous local eagles, vultures, and falcons)!

And for sheer pleasure, North Central Massachusetts is a great place to observe our feathered friends—at the abundant local and state parks, conservation areas and reservations throughout the region.

Here's a tip for bird enthusiasts: The Athol Bird and Nature Club, headquartered at the Millers River Environmental Center in Athol, has an active birding division that takes local bird trips in the spring and fall. The club also has an extensive collection of mounted bird specimens, some large such as the Great Gray Owl, and others much smaller such as a Black-capped Chickadee or various warbler species. The collection aids in educating interested bird enthusiasts on bird identification and bird adaptations. You can learn more about the ABNC online at atholbirdclub.org. §



Eagle Eyes

Our American Icon is a Comeback Story

Look up! That impressive silhouette you see against the bright blue sky just might be an American classic: a majestic Bald Eagle!

Once a rare sight in Massachusetts, bald eagles have made a remarkable comeback — thanks in large part to the Massachusetts Division of Fisheries and Wildlife and other conservation

organizations. According to MassWildlife, "from the 1940s until it was banned in 1972, the pesticide DDT caused egg mortality and further decline of the bald eagle.

"Restoration of the bald eagle in Massachusetts began in the 1980s, when MassWildlife and other partners transported young eaglets from wild nests (mostly from Canada) and raised them in cages overlooking the Quabbin Reservoir. Once the birds were ready to fledge, the cage doors were opened and the eagles released," the state website explains. From the 1990s until 2003, releases of captive-born eagles continued, and now the impressive birds can be spotted throughout the state — including right here in North Central Massachusetts!



Pepperell photographer Norman Bedard has been watching and photographing bald eagles around his hometown for several years, and has come to recognize individual birds (and their mates) as they sail over water bodies like Townsend Harbor and the Nashua River. "There has been a real influx of eagles around this area," Bedard says, noting that one local farmer reports having seen as many as 20 gathering over the winter.

It may surprise you to hear that winter is a great time to spot bald eagles — but MassWildlife says that winter bird-watchers have a great chance to see the impressive birds. The trick is knowing where to look. "Bald eagles usually live in coastal areas, estuaries, and larger inland

waters. They need a lot of shoreline habitat with forested areas for nesting. They prefer areas where some trees project above the forest canopy for perching with an unimpeded view. Bald eagles typically choose waterbodies with a good supply of moderate- to largesized fish," according to the MassWildlife website.

Bedard says one of his favorite spots for eagle photography is around Townsend

Harbor, right off Main Street (Route 119) in Townsend. "I've been able to photograph five eagles at one time, two adults and some immatures (eaglets) near the MassWildlife area on the Squannacook River," and has photographed eagles with their babies in nests in the area, he says. Bring your binoculars, and you might be able to spot some parents soaring high above their learning-to-fly offspring, keeping an eagle eye on the youngsters.

You can stretch your legs and do a little bird-watching at the same time, following a trail in the Marion Stoddard Conservation Area in Pepperell. Prefer a different view? Drop a canoe or kayak at the launch





site in the conservation area named after the local resident who has spent half a century protecting the Nashua River and area environment, and enjoy a leisurely paddle on that waterway.

The best times to spot these huge birds are evening and early morning, Bedard suggests. "They seem to be most active early in the morning, and again toward sundown."

That is, of course, just one area in which these majestic birds have been spotted. Local residents have also enjoyed watching them, for example, around Lake Shirley in Lunenburg, Wachusett Reservoir in the Clinton/Sterling area, and in the skies over Westminster and Fitchburg.

What are those eagles doing all winter, here in chilly climes? MassWildlife notes that "courtship takes place in mid- to late winter. After courtship, a mated pair builds or adds to a large nest in December—

February. The nest is built with large sticks and lined with sprigs of pine, grasses, and other soft materials. Male eagles collect the nest materials and deliver them to their mates, which are responsible for most of the actual nest construction. Once a nesting site is chosen, mated pairs usually return every year and add to the existing nest. Egg laying usually takes place from early March to early April."

If you see a bald eagle carrying sticks to a nest this winter, MassWildlife asks that you report your observation to mass.wildlife@mass.gov, including the location and date of the observation and your contact information.

These observations help MassWildlife identify new nest locations and monitor the eagle population.

Looking for something different to do this winter? Get out and look to the skies! §

FUN FACTS About Eagles

- The bald eagle is the largest nesting bird of prey in Massachusetts, with a wingspan of at least 6 feet, sometimes more than 7 feet.
- In the wild, bald eagles may live 20 years or more. The oldest wild individual on record lived 38 years.
- The eagle first appeared as an American symbol on one of the first U.S. coins, a copper piece minted in Massachusetts in 1776. The bald eagle became our national bird in 1782.



The Sime to Afit the Slopes!

hen Old Man Winter makes his annual tour of Johnny Appleseed Country, all eyes turn to the region's stately landmark: Wachusett Mountain, where bright trails of sparkling snow streak through the dark shades of evergreen foliage.

Local fields and backyards may still be clear, but when the mercury drops, the staff at Wachusett Mountain Ski Area swings into action, churning out miles and miles of the stuff that skiers' dreams are made of. It's snow season on the mountain, right here in Johnny's backyard!

This national-class ski area has a rabidly loyal ski and snowboarding following from Boston, Worcester, and across southern New England folks who recognize that you don't have to spend half your weekend driving to get to some great winter fun. The ski area has more than 100 trained instructors recognizable in their red ski school jackets. Inexpensive learn-to-ski and ride programs cater to first-timers and experienced riders seeking to hone their skills. Beginner packages come with gear rentals and even lift passes for those who love sliding on snow right away and want to try on their own. The Polar Kids program is for 4-8-year-olds, who then graduate to

the Arctic Aces for ages 9-12. Customizable group, semiprivate, private and group lessons are available.

Beyond the ski and snowboard school, Wachusett provides more specialized programs for school groups, disabled skiers, aspiring adult racers, and youth racers and ski and snowboard freestylers.

For that youthful freestyle community — one of the most vibrant and fun segments of the snow sports industry — Wachusett's terrain park complex is a magnet for ski and snowboarders who push the limits of on-snow creativity in a designated area set aside for them equipped with massive jumps and funky features.

With roots that date to the early 1960s with a couple of T-bar lifts, the modern history of Wachusett began in 1968 when the late Ralph Crowley and an associate won the bidding for the state lease to operate the ski area.

Today, Wachusett Mountain is a modern, professionally run ski resort that promises to stay under family control for many years into the future with the arrival of a third generation of Crowley managers on the scene and a lot more fun to come. §


