Happy 250th, Johnny!

f course you've heard of Johnny Appleseed—he's our official Massachusetts Folk Hero and a national legend—and this is a great time to learn more, as we celebrate his 250th birthday! Be sure to stop in at the Visitor Center on Route 2 for a slice of birthday cake on September 26, and to pick up a commemorative coin or postal first-day covers!

Why all the fuss? Well, while it's likely that the mention of Johnny's name conjures up images of a ragtag fellow with a stewpot for a hat and a bag on his back, casually strewing apple seeds as he wanders across the countryside—a caricature, familiar to anyone who has read childhood books—that image is both popular and misleading. Popular, because it gives instant recognition

to Johnny and his travels across the country. But misleading because John Chapman—also known as Johnny Appleseed—was actually a successful businessman who helped many pioneers survive and new communities flourish.

Born right here in Leominster on September 26, 1774, John Chapman was born to Nathaniel and Elizabeth Simons Chapman. Not much is known about his early life other than that his mother died when he was just two years old. His father packed up Johnny and his sister and moved about 50 miles across the state, settling in the Springfield area.

As a young man, Johnny headed west, making a name for himself as a businessman as he travelled for nearly 50 years across a growing

nation. Along the way, he planted apple seeds—not scattering them carelessly, but with an eye toward a future market for his crops. He sold, and often gave away, seeds and seedlings to settlers in communities. Historians tell us that Johnny was a vegetarian, a lifelong bachelor, and religious man of peace—a "primitive Christian." He died in Fort Wayne, Indiana, on March 18, 1845.

But his legend lives on! Each year, we celebrate National Johnny Appleseed Day on his birthday, September 26.

His entire hometown of Leominster is celebrating Johnny's 250th this fall,



complete with a special display at the Historical Society, lectures, a dance, special school programs and celebratory events at Sholan Farms, the last working orchard in the city. See page 8 in this issue of The Guide for a complete listing of the city's special birthday events.

You can learn more about Johnny Appleseed, too, here at the Johnny Appleseed Visitor Center on Route 2 Westbound, between Exits 103 & 102. The center is stocked with a variety of books suitable for all ages—from coloring books for kids to more serious historical volumes. A display case serves as home to an assortment of Johnny memorabilia.

And, especially in this birthday year, the kids might enjoy having their pictures taken with the bronze statue of a youthful Johnny, standing at the entrance to the center! §

The Apple of Your Eye

Fall is the perfect time for a country tour—and North Central Massachusetts is the perfect spot for that tour! Apples hang heavy on the trees, farmstands are piled high with fresh veggies, and the whole family can enjoy a hayride through blazing autumn foliage.

Even though this is known as Johnny Appleseed Country, there's so much more than apples to sample here. From late summer right through to the first frosty days of October (and beyond, if Mother Nature cooperates!), local farms and orchards are ideal spots for family outings.

Did you know there are dozens of varieties of apples grown here? Your local supermarket may offer a handful of the most familiar, from Red Delicious to Granny Smiths, but the orchards of this region will open your eyes to a whole new world of flavor! You can head out into the orchard to pick your own, or simply make your selections from the stands and stores.

From Ginger Golds and Paula Reds in August to Macouns and Galas in September and Baldwins and Russets in October, there's always something interesting to pick here.

And biting into a sweet Honey Crisp, juicy Mutsu or tangy

Macintosh is just the beginning when you visit a local orchard. The **Red Apple Farm** in Phillipston, and **Carlson Orchards** in Harvard invite you to raise a glass, too—of cider pressed from those local fruits.

Cider, of course, was a staple of every New England household in Colonial days. From the first English settlers to the late 1800s, Americans enjoyed cider—and at a time when water often contained dangerous bacteria, cider was a safer, more sanitary beverage option. It was a staple on most dinner tables, and there was even a special version for children. That worked out well for our hometown hero, John Chapman, who traveled west across the growing nation, planting apple trees that may not have produced great fruit for snacking, but provided the apples for cider production.

Unfortunately, cider experienced gradual decline in popularity due

to various political and socioeconomic factors over the years, and after the 18th amendment was ratified in 1919, and prohibition of alcohol in the United States took effect, the production of cider became illegal; even fresh apple juice production was severely limited. Prohibitionists ensured that nearly all cider apple trees in the country were given the ax or the torch, undoing much of John Chapman's work.

But today's ciders have gone far beyond the staple of centuries ago. Consider these options at Carlson Orchards: Three Brothers Blend, "A semi-dry hard cider made from Heirloom French and American hard cider apples fermented with a white wine yeast from the Burgundy region of France. This cider is crisp, well balanced, and refreshing with just a hint of tartness," or Blueberry Lavender, "Our newest cider on tap! Starting with our classic "Oak Hill Blend", we added Blueberry juice, Culinary Lavender, and Spring honey to make a refreshing spring cider."

In the mood for lunch? Local farms have you covered there, too—with options ranging from prepared deli sandwiches to made-on-site BBQ, brick-oven pizza and more. And don't forget the ice cream for dessert!



Want still more to do? You can find live music on many weekends, too, from Red Apple Farm in Phillipston to Hollis Hills Farm in Fitchburg, as the region celebrates this very special New England season!

Get the kids off the phones and show them where the food they enjoy comes from—down on the farm! §

Freedom Trail and the Mohawk Trail.



All in the (Farm) Family

Branches laden with red apples. Fields dotted with bright orange pumpkins. Farmstands overflowing with just-picked vegetables. Animals waiting to be petted. Music filling the air.

North Central Massachusetts has a centuries-old history of farming—rocky soil that's been cultivated by generations of families, while constantly evolving to keep up with the times.

What's new down on the farm these days? Check out these familiar spots today!

Bolton Orchards

Covering about 200 acres, this popular stop for visitors was once part of the Davis family farm. Generations ago, the farm was divided, and Bolton Orchards grew a great reputation for its apples.

As years went on, the farm added corn, peaches, pumpkins and more to its fields—and that oh, so popular, beverage, apple cider, said Sarah O'Toole, who with her husband Joel represents the sixth generation of the Davis family to farm the land.

Bolton Orchards is known for its expansive yearround farm stand featuring not only fruits and veggies grown by the family, but produce from neighboring farms, along with deli items and ice cream. "We're still farmers at heart," Sarah says, and offering a variety of locally-produced, healthy foods is a way of life here.



Davis Farmland/Mega Maze

Just down the road, Davis Farmland and Mega Maze in Sterling is a seventh-generation, 165-year tradition that has evolved over recent decades into, well, the "Adventureland" that has become part of its

The 300-acre Farmland isn't a typical New England farm these days: the 300 acres are home to all manner of wildlife—from deer to coyotes, turkeys

and bobcats—along with the largest sanctuary of endangered and heritage livestock in North America! "Sustainability" has become a hallmark of the Davis property, where green projects include a 15-acre solar farm.

The "Davis Farmland" side of this family operation is totally kid-oriented, with farm-oriented activities, playgrounds and entertainment. Across the street, Davis Mega Maze is an adventure for the entire family. Picture it: twisting paths through eight acres of corn, with bridges, games and activities to explore along the way.

But wait! There's more! As the Davis spread evolved from a farm to an endangered farm animal sanctuary to an awesome playground to a world-class corn maze, fifth-generation farmer Larry Davis also grew the entertainment side, with zip lines, barbecue to help "sustain" visitors, and entertainment to add to the farm fun!

Of course there are apples at Red Apple Farm in Phillipston—along with blueberries, pumpkins, goats, chickens, and oh, don't forget the cider donuts!

Fourth-generation farmer Al Rose and his family keep the farm humming year-round these days. No longer a seasonal orchard enterprise, as it was when his grandfather cared for the land, the hillside farm now draws visitors throughout the year. "Each of us has been given caretaker status, to keep the farm going," Rose says, and the challenge has been to keep the New England farm relevant in a changing world. Over the decades, the family has embraced "ag tourism"—helping visitors to appreciate the New England farm experience.

So along with family-oriented pick-your-own apples,

animals to visit, and hayrides through the orchard, Red Apple has a large farm store featuring local products, and, more recently, a Brew Barn where both food and live entertainment are on the menu, beer from Moon Hill Brewing and cider made right on the farm. Hiking, cross-country skiing, dazzling holiday lights ... the farm is a four-season venture for the Rose family.





Carlson Orchards

Yes, there's a good reason they call this Johnny Appleseed Country! Local communities have been home to generations of orchardists—although these days, apples are joined by a host of other popular fruits on the rolling hillsides.

Founded in 1936 by Walter and Eleanor Carlson, the farm has changed over the decades. In the thirties and forties, the Carlson family made their living from a diversified farm that included chickens, cows, potatoes and apples. In the late sixties, apples became the main



crop, as the farm evolved and specialized in fruits.

Today, granddaughter Katie Carlson runs the farm that has 100 acres producing apples, peaches, nectarines, blueberries, raspberries, sweet cherries and pumpkins. And don't forget the fresh-pressed cider! Like many area farms, Carlson Orchards invites visitors to "pick your own" fruits in season—and will keep you entertained with live music, "Themed Thursdays" in the Cider Barn, and even smoked BBQ during food truck season.

Smith's Country Cheese

A few years ago, the Smith family in Winchendon, famous for their locally-produced cheese, decided it was time to retire—but they didn't let the popular farm just fade away. The local dairy farmers worked with two new families—Jake & Allie Catlin and Mike & Leah Catlin—to teach them everything, from caring for the cows to making their award-winning cheeses.

Nearly a decade has passed since the Catlins became dairy farmers, caring for hundreds of cows and creating cultured butter, cheddar, farmer's cheese, Gouda, Havarti and more to sell in their farm store, in shops throughout the region, and by mail.

Love cows? Love cheese? Visitors are welcome to stop by the farm, see the cows and even watch the cheese being made! §

Pepperell's Birthday Bash

Happy birthday, Pepperell! With the roots of Massachusetts stretching right back to the founding of this nation, it's not surprising that over the past several years, cities and towns across the state have been lighting very large birthday candles.

In 2025, the local focus will be on Pepperell. It began as a community of settlements from Groton on scattered farms and river crossings on the Nashua and Nissitissit Rivers in the 1720s, became Groton West Parish in 1742, a district in 1753 and a town on August 23, 1775.

The community's birthday party is planned as a year-long celebration that includes a reenactment of the raising of the Liberty Flag on September 7, 2024, 250 years after local residents raised Pepperell's first flag in response to British oppression and a show of the colonists' fierce loyalty in the fight for the ideals of liberty and justice.

The 1774 Pepperell District Meeting record states: "This being a time when the civil liberty of this province are unjustly infringed upon, when the ministry of Old England have endeavored to take away our

Charter rights and privileges and the people of this province very much disturbed, every one looking after English liberties as departing from North America when congresses are appointed and appointing and the struggles very high, the people of this District prepared and raised a pole by the name of Liberty Pole the height of which was one hundred feet on the common directly before the Publick Meeting House door on the 29th day of August A.D. 1774 with a flag of Blew (sic) and red cloth five yards long and four breadths wide with convenience to hoist it to the top of the pole with ease."

Another historical re-enactment, "The Women Who Guarded the Bridge," is planned for May 3, 2025. The re-enactment features Pepperell's local heroine Prudence Wright, who assembled a band of women dressed in men's clothing to guard the bridge over the Nashua River in Pepperell, at the beginning of the Revolutionary War.

"Their strong will and bravery," the town's website notes, "resulted in the capture of a British spy in late April of 1775." Previously re-enacted

by the Town's Covered Bridge Committee in 2010 at the grand re-opening of the Pepperell Covered Bridge and by the DAR in Pepperell's annual Fourth of July Parade, this historic event is being brought back by popular demand.

The 2025 re-enactment will take place at the Prudence Wright Scenic Overlook, alongside the historic Pepperell Covered Bridge, on land owned by the Massachusetts Division of Fisheries & Wildlife. The Prudence Wright Overlook and the Pepperell Covered Bridge are symbols of the struggles and successes that occurred outside the battlefields of Lexington, Concord and Boston during our ancestors' fight for independence.

And, yes, there's more! This birthday party will run throughout late 2024 and well into 2025, so stay tuned! You can follow the town's evolving plans for this celebration by following Pepperell's 250th Celebration on Facebook. §

BE A SPORT!

ou don't have to be a great athlete (or even a mediocre one!) to test your skills, stretch some muscles and maybe take on a little competition in North Central Massachusetts.

Hiking the region's numerous trails may be the most popular form of exercise for local residents and visitors—but there's so much more to do when you want to get your heart rate up, your lungs filled with fresh air and the kinks out of those stiff joints. Here are a few affordable (or even free!) ideas to help you keep in shape on your visit.

Stay on Course

Spin a disc—on one of the area's disc golf courses. These popular attractions have been popping up in parks and woodlands in recent years, each offering its own unique setting and challenges. Fall is a perfect time to take a scenic ride to the

Royalston Fish & Game Club for an enjoyable 18-hole experience. **The Flat Rock** course in Petersham

The Flat Rock course in Petersham has been described as "a classic short and technical New England woods course." At the eastern end of the region, **Devens** offers three courses: The Hill, The General and The Commander. Fitchburg's **Coggshall Park** is a pleasure to visit any time of the year, and the disc course adds a fun feature to this great escape spot in the city.

Among the newest local courses are **Meadowbrook Orchards** in Sterling (which, as you might guess, meanders through an apple orchard!) and **Bailey Brook** course in Gardner.

Looking for a short game? Try the **Ingleside course** at the new Community Park in Winchendon. Only three holes were complete in June, but work was progressing on another seven—so you can enjoy a new experience with every visit!



Pickleball, anyone?

Doyle Field in Leominster, with six outdoor hard courts, is a popular place to play pickleball...and the courts are open at no cost. Players have access to restrooms and water.

Fish Park on Maple Street in Athol has two outdoor courts that visitors can use for free. The courts are hard surface with temporary lines; bring your own nets.

The West Sterling Athletic Fields off Route 62 in Sterling have five lighted outdoor courts with permanent lines—but again, plan to bring your own nets.

Weather not cooperating? The Fitness Center at Mt. Wachusett Community College has four indoor pickleball courts, along with its two outdoor courts, so you can stay in shape even if Mother Nature throws

you a curve ball! **The Community Center in Lancaster** and **Game On Fitchburg** also have indoor courts that you can play for a one-time fee.



Paddle Your Own Canoe

With an abundance of lakes, ponds, and rivers, North Central Massachusetts is a paddler's paradise. The Nashua River runs through much of the region, and, with its tributaries, can be enjoyed from many spots.

The Nashua River Watershed **Association**, which has been instrumental over recent decades in preserving and promoting the river, has a terrific Nashua River Canoe and Kayak Guide that provides detailed information on the Nashua, Nissitissit, Squannacook, North Nashua, and Stillwater Rivers including information on canoe put-ins and take-outs, river hazards like dams and rapids, portages, and mile-by-mile notes for all paddle-able segments. The NRWA's list of launch sites includes spots in Devens, Groton, Harvard, Lancaster, Pepperell, Shirley, Sterling and Townsend.

At the western edge of the region, the Millers River watershed is another paddler's delight. **The Millers** **River Watershed Association** was instrumental in development "Blue Trails on that river and its tributaries. Enjoy a trip on the Millers River Blue Trail (MRBT), which runs between Cass Meadow in Athol and River Front Park in Orange, or the Otter River Blue Trail from East Templeton to Gardner.

Didn't bring a canoe or kayak with you on your North Central Massachusetts tour? No problem! Swing by **Nashoba Paddler** in Groton—where you can not only rent equipment, but can also take advantage of a special event like a Fall Foliage Paddle. And in Orange, Billy Goat Boats—located on the Millers River—rents everything from canoes and kayaks to paddle boats and stand up paddle boards. For a unique experience, plan on visiting in mid-September to see (or even join in!) the **Orange Solstice Riverfest**, complete with fire pots and lighted boats on the river! §






Wachusett Dam in Clinton is an engineering marvel. When it was completed in 1905, it was the largest gravity dam in the world, creating a reservoir that holds about 65 billion gallons of water. Built by a cadre of Italian, Greek, Irish, and Polish immigrants, Wachusett Reservoir is the second-largest body of water in Massachusetts. The top of the dam is open to visitors only two days a year, but the grounds are open year round. Visit mass.gov/locations/wachusett-reservoir.

MARVELOUS MUSEUMS

Contemporary art. Local history. Cultures from around the world.

Tour the museums of North Central Massachusetts, and you can explore an Egyptian tomb, see Eastern European icons up close and personal, or learn about the changing face of New England forests. And along the way, you can revel in the blazing colors of fall foliage, see crystalline branches sparkling in the winter sun, or simply enjoy the bright green fields and forests of spring and summer.

The Fitchburg Art Museum, in

downtown Fitchburg, is the leading cultural institution in North Central Massachusetts, and has been an important part of the region's identity, culture, and history for almost one hundred years.

FAM was founded through a bequest from Fitchburg native and American Impressionist painter, Eleanor Norcross (1854-1923). Norcross was motivated by two beliefs: that exposure to the fine art and crafts would be beneficial to the lives and productivity of the city's millworkers, and that great cities were marked by great public institutions. At FAM, on permanent display, is the exhibition

Evoking Eleanor, which includes Norcross's paintings, artworks that she collected during her art career in Paris, and information about her life and legacy.

Another popular permanent exhibition at FAM is *Discover Ancient Egypt*, several galleries devoted to telling the story of ancient Egyptian civilization through authentic artworks and artifacts, reproductions of important treasures, and hands-on learning activities for kids and families. These activities can also be found throughout the Museum, in FAM's colorful and engaging Learning Lounges.

FAM has a collection of over 8,000 works of art, with particular strengths in American Art, African Art, and photography, which can be seen in changing exhibitions throughout the museum. Through February 23, 2025, visitors can enjoy Africa Rising: 21st Century African Photography, a visually stunning exhibition of over fifty photographs created by artists from across the continent in a wide range of styles. And through January 5, 2025, FAM will feature G.O.A. T (Greatest of All Time): The Sports Photography of Walter Iooss. Iooss's dramatic color images of American athletes graced the covers of over 300 issues of Sports Illustrated magazine.



FAM is also New England's leading presenter of the work of contemporary artists in our region, and the 2024-2025 exhibition season includes solo exhibitions by three prominent artists. In the fall of 2024, the Museum will present Bob Dilworth: When I Remember Home. Dilworth, from Providence, Rhode Island, creates enormous multi-media paintings about the people from the African American community of his childhood in Virginia. The winter/ spring of 2025 will feature the career retrospective exhibition of Worcester photographer Stephen DiRado, and emerging Boston photographer Tara Sellios. DiRado's black-and-

white images are documents of his life with family and friends in Central Massachusetts and Martha's Vineyard, and Sellios' wildly creative color photos are based on constructed images of natural materials like bones, bugs, and foliage.

FAM's Community Gallery is a showcase for artists in our local community, and presents exhibitions organized by local schools, artist organizations, and non-profits that offer art programs for their clients. This year's roster includes shows organized by the North County Land Trust, the Aldrich Astronomical Society, and Making Opportunity Count.

The Museum's activities are not limited to exhibitions! FAM offers a wide range of events and public programs, and engages in collaborations with the Fitchburg Public Schools, Fitchburg State University, and other partners. FAM sponsors public art projects for the City of Fitchburg, and is currently working with NewVue Communities on the Fitchburg Arts Community, a campus of 68 units of artist-preference affordable housing, right across the street from the Museum, which will be ready for occupancy in January, 2025. FAM is also a fully bilingual English/Spanish museum.

Icon Museum & Study Center

The small industrial town of Clinton may seem an unlikely home for the largest collection of icons in the United States. After heading a successful company in town, Gordon Lankton decided that when the time came to display the icons he had collected while traveling the world, he would establish his museum in a historic building here.

The whole family will find the icons fascinating—children will enjoy examining the icons with magnifying glasses and taking an all-ages scavenger hunt in the galleries.

But, you may ask, what is an icon, and why is this museum so special? Although they're intriguing art works, don't think of icons as paintings; icons are "written" rather than "painted"—a complex set of interwoven symbols



that have evolved over centuries to form a refined and sophisticated visual language. When "reading" an icon, colors, clothing, hairstyles, gestures, and objects the subject holds all offer insight into what the iconographer was trying to convey. Icons range in size from the very small (for home use) to very large (for cathedrals). They are not worshiped, but are, rather, venerated and used in prayer. Traditionally unsigned, icons are considered a window or portal into a divine realm.

And right here in Clinton, you can visit the United States solely dedicated to Russian icons, holding the largest collection of Russian icons in North America, and one of the largest private collections outside of Russia!



Fisher Museum

If you think a forest is a forest is a forest...and the landscape you're seeing today is the same as the landscape the Colonists saw two centuries ago, think again!

The Fisher Museum at Harvard Forest in Petersham tells a different story—the story of the pre-settlement forest and how it changed as the early settlers cleared land for homesteads and farming, and changed again as farming was abandoned and different species of trees began to fill in the empty fields. (If you've ever hiked through local forests, you've no doubt seen the remnants this evolution—the stone walls that long ago marked the edges of a farmer's field.)

At the Fisher Museum, the changing landscape is a story told in dioramas, or models—and it's about more than just fields and trees. Learn about the effects of forest fires on the land, about wildlife habitats, and about conservation. And you'll be fascinated by the new panorama honoring Nipmuc land stewardship and collaboration. The kids can enjoy a scavenger hunt, too, as they take a closer look at the highly-detailed dioramas.

Want to stretch your legs? The Fisher Museum is located in a 3,850-acre forest with 32 miles of trails! Feel free to visit any time—the trails are open 365 days a



year. Brochures are available for a half-mile self-guided reflective trail (new in 2024) centering on local Indigenous land-kinship concepts; a self-guided ecology and Colonial history trail that begins at the Fisher Museum and covers 2.5 miles; a self-guided nature and Colonial history trail that begins at the museum and covers 0.5 miles (marked with red blazes); and more.

See the forests, see the world, see what's new in the studios of today's New England artists—tour a museum today! §

ART From the Heart of the Region

What better way could there be to learn about the region you're visiting than to see it through the eyes of local artists?

While North Central Massachusetts is fortunate to have noteworthy institutions like the **Fitchburg Art**Museum, the Icon Museum and Study Center, the Fisher Museum at Harvard Forest, and Fruitlands Museum in Harvard, small galleries in nearly every city and town regularly turn the spotlight on the work of local residents and works they choose to display.

These exhibitions tend to change from month to month, so no matter when (or how often) you tour the region, there's always a fresh perspective waiting to be discovered. Watercolors, sculpture, photographs, pottery, jewelry and more are on display every day, year-round, in these community galleries, often tucked away in libraries and senior centers.

Ready to explore the heart of the region? Here's a sampling of places you can find contemporary works (many of which may be available for purchase!) in area cities and towns.

The Meeting Hall Gallery, tucked between the Townsend Public Library and Senior Center, is home to changing exhibits of artwork and history. Check their schedule at townsendlibrary.org.

The Little Art Gallery at Westminster Town Hall, 11 South St., Westminster, features the work of artists on a monthly basis and can be viewed during regular Town Hall hours in the first floor lobby.

Gallery Sitka at 2 Shaker Rd., Shirley, is a woman-owned and operated New England art gallery in Shirley. Focusing on abstract art, Gallery Sitka represents the work of 20+ painters, sculptors, encaustic artists, and a few jewelry designers from New England and beyond. Visit gallerysitka.com.

The Gardner Museum, 26 Pearl St., Gardner, displays works including a photography exhibit, "Northeast Wild life Through My Eyes" by Jeff Sargent, from September 1 through the end of the year, along with centuries of crafted items from the city's past. Gardnermuseuminc.com.

The Boulder Art Gallery, located on Fitchburg's historic Upper Common on Main street—a short walk from the Fitchburg Art Museum—features original art, vintage art, photography, prints and sculpture. It's one of the area's most exciting venues for period and contemporary art.

The Diamond Heart Art Studio at 112 Main St., Gardner, is an art gallery and more—offering classes, book signings and other events, too. Stop by to see artists at work!

From paper mosaics to pottery, the **Petersham Art Center** at 8 North St. always has something new to see (and do—classes are offered on a regular basis) in its picturesque home in a picturesque town! The East Wing Gallery at Mt. Wachusett Community College, 444 Green St., Gardner, showcases works by students and contemporary artists. The college also has a permanent collection featuring exemplary work from graduating art students, visiting artists, and alumni. Visit mwcc.edu.

The Hammond Hall Art Gallery at Fitchburg State University, 160 Pearl St., Fitchburg, exhibits student work throughout the year. Special annual exhibitions include *Visions*, a juried honors showcase of the year's best original student work in FSU's Communications Media Department; and *ARTeries*, a bi-annual juried exhibition showcasing original student work in drawing, painting, sculpture, and mixed-media art. FEELING FESTIVE?

From the first apple blossoms of spring to the joy of the holiday season, there's always something to celebrate in North Central Massachusetts

After a summer packed with blueberry festivals, peach festivals, sunflower festivals and more, local communities are ready to move into high gear in the fall—it is, after all, apple season in Johnny Appleseed's back yard! But there's so much more than apples on the festival menu here; you won't want to miss the Oktoberfest parties (featuring great brews crafted here); pumpkin festivals, where families can gather, and even decorate, those bright orange orbs; and, of course, garlic! Yes, the "festival that stinks" is a late-September tradition in Orange.

And the fun doesn't end with the harvest festivals on area farms. The Johnny Appleseed Festival is held right in downtown Leominster, and food trucks gather at Wachusett Mountain Ski Area for festival-goers who want to



Winter Wonderland

What could create more of a "New England" feeling than a leisurely stroll on a crisp winter evening? How about a stroll that's illuminated by thousands ... no, tens of thousands ... even hundreds of thousands ... of holiday lights?

There's no doubt that the acres of rolling orchards at **Red Apple Farm** in Phillipston are stunning in the spring, when the pink and white apple blossoms are in bloom, and breezes send petals fluttering like a soft snowfall. But the orchard takes on an entire new life, a new panorama, when winter arrives. The apple blossoms, leaves and ruby-red fruits of spring, summer and fall may have faded—but they give way in winter to miles and miles of twinkling lights, creating a country wonderland.

Al Rose, whose family has owned the hilltop farm for four generations, decided a few years ago that the fields and orchards deserved to be enjoyed beyond the last harvests of fall. Visitors were already trekking to the farm to shop in the country store and gather at the brew barn for food and music year-round—so why not help them enjoy the great outdoors when the air is crisp and clear, and the trees and fields are covered in snow? He teamed up with Lester Spear to create a new tradition for visitors to enjoy.

"The first year, we used about 100,000 lights, and then went to 200,000 last year ... and it's growing," Rose said.

Visitors on a winter evening can follow meandering pathways through the orchard, stop by a fire pit to warm up, and enjoy a mug of cider along the way. The paths, of course, aren't paved—this is, after all, a working farm—but are suitable for most folks, including kids in strollers, to traverse.

"We love New England," Rose said, "but in the winter, people may start to feel closed in. "This is another way for folks to get out and enjoy the country. It's a memorable thing to do with a family. It's kind of a Norman Rockwell, Currier & Ives, old-fashioned kind of experience."

But Wait! There's More!

Love the lights? Want even more? You're in luck!

The Red Apple Farm offers a true

country experience—but if you just can't get enough of holiday lights, the region has a couple more great options for you to try!

The New England Botanic Garden at Tower Hill also has a walking experience awaiting your visit. Running from Thanksgiving through the end of the year, the holiday lights transform the formal gardens and conservatories into a glittering world. The Night Lights display is a key fundraiser for New England Botanic Garden, a nonprofit organization operated by the Worcester County Horticultural Society. The exhibit runs nightly from 4 to 10 p.m., and tickets can be purchased through the website, nebg.org.

Don't feel like walking? Pack up the family for an awe-inspiring drive through the **Lancaster Fairgrounds**, a mile-long "Celebration of Lights" trip sparkling with a million LED lights

during the holiday season.

And if you enjoy holiday light displays but would rather sit, relax and let the show sweep over you, head up to **Sholan Farms** in Leominster. High on a hill overlooking the city, the volunteer-run orchard puts on a dazzling





light display; sit in your car, turn your radio on, and enjoy the show!

Winter days may be short—but there's plenty of light to brighten your holiday season wherever you are in North Central Massachusetts! §

As soon as the first flakes of snow hit the trails at Wachusett Mountain, ski enthusiasts pack up their gear and head to Princeton by car and train, anxious to hit the slopes for a fun day (or evening!).

But did you know that Wachusett Mountain Ski Area offers more than its popular 27 trails, eight lifts, and 100 percent snowmaking ability?

Wachusett Mountain—located right here in Central Massachusetts—is home to some of the best skiing and snowboarding in the region. It is well known for its beginner lessons, top of the line snowmaking and grooming, and great food options. However, we're going to give you a peek at a few things to do on the mountain that only the locals know about.

So...here are four things to do on the slopes of Wachusett Mountain that might be news to you:

1. **Night Skiing.** Wachusett is open daily until 9:30 pm, making it an ideal stop after school or work to get some much needed outdoor time in the winter! The lodge does get cozy with all the school group kids, but they are usually all out by 6 or 7 pm, leaving plenty of space on the hill (and in the restaurant).



2. **Terrain Park.** If you're a little daring or just want to explore a new type of skiing or snowboarding, look no further than the terrain park. With a wide variety of features including jumps, boxes, rails, spines, hits, and jibs there are plenty of ways to take your riding to the next level. Don't worry if you're new to the park scene, there is a dedicated beginner area with small unimposing features for those who just want to dip their toe in.

3. Bullock Lodge Cider House. Located in between Conifer Connection and Salamander Cutoff Trail you'll find Bullock Lodge, a 1930s stone lodge originally built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the days long before chairlifts whisked us to the top of the mountain. The lodge has been renovated and is now operated by Red Apple Farm out of Phillipston, serving up hot cider, fresh cider donuts, and apple turnovers. The cozy wood stove-heated interior and rustic charm make this the perfect stop during your ski day.



4. Balance Rock Trail top to bottom. Balance Rock trail was one of the original ski trails cut back when Wachusett was a state-run operation. The trail still exists today, but because of the intersection with Conifer Connection, it is hard to see it as a full run. But when all the sections of the trail are open, a fun adventure is to ski the whole thing from the summit to the base. Try these out on your next visit to Wachusett! §



OUT OF THIS WORLD


ave you run into Bigfoot lately while hiking through local forests? Are you convinced that alien life forms have visited our planet? Do you feel a certain, unnerving, energy when you enter some buildings or pass by some objects?

Whether you're a believer, or a skeptic, when it comes to paranormal experiences and the likelihood of extraterrestrial visitors, you'll want to plan a stop at **The Education Earth Museum** in downtown Athol. Launched in May, 2024 by Storm Plains, a forensic psychologist with a background in archaeology and cryptozoology (the study of legendary, mythological, or unknown creatures and animals who are rumored to exist, but have not been proven to be real... yet!),

the small but fascinating storefront museum has been attracting visitors from throughout New England and beyond since its grand opening.

And those visitors, Plains says, are often happy—even anxious—to share with her their experiences, from Bigfoot sightings to alien abductions and spottings of the "White Lady," the subject of a ghost story shrouded in mystery and sorrow. "I had it in the back of my mind for about 12 years, to open a museum," just happened upon the Athol location, and things fell into place, she explained.

Over the years, Plains—who has also done paranormal and wildlife lectures, and works with rescue animals like snapping turtles and snakes—accumulated an assortment of interesting items. Animatronics,

like Demogorgon and Michigan Dogman. A replica of the Annabelle doll that was housed at the Occult Museum of famed paranormal investigators Ed and Lorraine Warren. A display representing the examination of an alien body in


Hangar 18.

Hangar 18 at Area 51. And a back room of the museum is home to some live (and some preserved via taxidermy) animals.

Each exhibit is accompanied by an explanation, chart or other materials that add an educational component to the display. While the subjects,

Plains notes, may not be suitable for very young children, older kids (and adults) are welcome to take selfies, turn on the animated figures, and ask lots of questions! Plains is already planning to bring more materials out of storage, offering changing exhibits to keep things fresh, along with lectures and podcasts.

Looking for something a bit unusual—even other-worldly—to do? Stop by the Education Earth Museum at 475 Main St. in Athol for an interesting experience! The museum is open Thursdays through Sundays, or by appointment. §





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
