Johnny Appleseed Country

oes the name "Johnny Appleseed" conjure up images of a rag-tag fellow with a stewpot for a hat and a bag of apples on his back?


This caricature, familiar to anyone who has read childhood books, is both popular and misleading. Popular, because it gives instant recognition to Johnny and his travels across the country. But misleading because John Chapman — also known as Johnny Appleseed — was actually a successful businessman who helped many pioneers survive and new communities flourish.


Born right here in Leominster on September 26, 1774, John Chapman made a name for himself across a growing nation. Along the way, he planted apple seeds — not simply scattering them carelessly, but with an eye toward a future market for his crops. He sold, and often gave away, seeds and seedlings to settlers in communities along the way. His nearly 50 years of travels took him far and wide across a young nation.

To learn more about Johnny Appleseed, begin at a spot that bears his name: The Johnny Appleseed Visitor Center on Route 2 Westbound, between Exits 35 and 34. The center is stocked with a variety of books suitable for all ages — from coloring books for kids to more serious historical volumes. A display case serves as home to an assortment of Johnny memorabilia, and visitors can purchase first-day stamped postcards bearing the official Johnny Appleseed postage stamp.

Kids might enjoy having their pictures taken with the bronze statue of a youthful Johnny, standing at the entrance to the center! §

North Central Massachusetts Offers Many Opportunities for Outings with Pets

Pets — domesticated animals kept by humans for companionship, friendship, and pleasure — become part of the family. It makes sense that they should come along on family outings. North Central Massachusetts, a beautiful area of the Bay State, offers many locations and opportunities for pets to join their families for activities enjoyable to all.

Many public spaces — parks, rail trails, and reservations — allow and encourage companion animals, especially dogs, to visit along with their owners. Families arriving in the North Central Massachusetts area might stop at Johnny Appleseed Visitor Center on Route 2 westbound in Lancaster. In addition to restrooms for two-legged folks, the center has a nice dogwalk area. Nearby Leominster State Park welcomes dogs as does Prospect Park, also located in Leominster.

Check out Fitchburg's Coolidge Park for dogs and their owners at 198 Townsend Street. Not far away, Wachusett Mountain State Reservation in Princeton provides space where everyone, including dogs, can enjoy a nice outing and beautiful vistas for many miles in all directions.

New England Botanic Garden at Tower Hill serves as a pet-friendly attraction in Boylston. Farther west, Dunn State Park in Gardner is friendly to dogs with their keepers. Doane's Falls in Royalston welcomes dogs along petfriendly trails.

Many area farms and apple orchards welcome dogs and other pets. Sholan Farms in Leominster, Red Apple Farm in Phillipston, Hollis Hills Farm in Fitchburg, Bolton Spring Farm and Nashoba Valley Winery Orchard, both in Bolton, Clearview Farm in Sterling, and Doe Orchard in Harvard encourage pets to visit with their owners.

The Trustees of Reservations have long welcomed dogs to many, although not all, of their properties. Many rail trails take in dog-walkers — consult regulations for specific trails as to their policies. Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation, DCR, welcomes dogs on leash in most parks, forests, and reservations. Most areas

surrounding watersheds are off limits to pets due to concerns about contamination of drinking water. Most websites for public areas list policies on pet visits. Posted signs may spell out pet policies.

Massachusetts restaurants do not allow dogs except for service animals. Individual towns and cities have their own regulations about allowing dogs inside businesses other than restaurants. Tractor Supply, for example, welcomes leashed dogs at their stores.

Bring Fido is a great website listing many dog-friendly areas in Massachusetts. See bringfido.com/attraction/state/Massachusetts.

Companion animals comprise an important part of many households — families with children, couples, and even those living alone. Enjoying good times with pets is important not only to their owners but to the pets, too. North Central Massachusetts offers good times not only to those with two legs but to those with four legs.

Diversification at Red Apple Farm

iversification. That's the key to this operation," said Al Rose, fourth generation owner of Red Apple Farm in Phillipston with his wife and business partner, Nancy.

"We don't run the business," Nancy commented. "It runs us."

With its vast orchards plus restaurant/tap room and brew barn, cidery, store, events, and more at 455 Highland Avenue in Phillipston, Red Apple Farm "transforms into a lively marketplace with a rich tapestry of experiences," according to the website, redapplefarm.com. This multi-faceted farm stays open daily all year with an array of on-site offerings plus inventive experiences nearly every month for families and other visitors.

With ninety-eight acres in cultivation, Red Apple Farm also sells its wares in Boston Public Market at 100 Hanover Street and at Wachusett Mountain in Princeton.

After an Easter Great Gathering on Saturday, April 19, to benefit Phillipston Congregational Church, the Roses have planned Enchanted Orchard Renaissance Faire on Saturday and Sunday, May 3 and 4. "Merchants from distant realms and folk from near and far will gather in celebration of May Day and the planting

season," according to the website.

Al and Nancy made Red Apple Farm their business and home in 2001 when they came from Chicago to work with Al's father, Bill Rose, third-generation overseer of the business.

With a 1997 master's degree in agricultural economics from Cornell University in New York state, Al had other experiences that made him well-suited to oversee the apple business. As potato buyer for Frito Lay when he and Nancy lived in Chicago, Al had contacts with seventeen farms, including some on the East Coast and as near as Framingham.

In 1929, the Rose family acquired the orchard at the heart of Red Apple Farm when Al's grandfather, A. Spaulding Rose, and his wife, Carolyn, bought the apple-rich land from Warren Tyler, then president of Athol Savings Bank. Spaulding had studied pomology, the science of apples.

Mr. Tyler began the orchard in 1912 when he bought the property and planted, among other trees, one bearing MacIntosh apples and still producing as the oldest MacIntosh tree in the state.

Harry Chester Rose and Cora Spaulding Rose, Spaulding Rose's parents, financed the 1929 acquisition of the orchard, thus establishing themselves as the first generation of Roses involved with Red Apple Farm. Spaulding cultivated the land with a one-horsepower tractor, according to Al. "That is," clarified Nancy, "a tractor pulled by one actual horse. Today we use a seventy-five horsepower mechanized tractor."

When the farm and orchard passed to him from Spaulding, Bill Rose ran a diverse business that included considerable wholesale selling to US food chains. In the 1980s, Bill stopped wholesaling. His grandmother Carolyn said, "WHAT????"

From the beginning in 1929, the orchard had an on-site retail store, and Bill expanded retail business with an eye toward agritourism. Red Apple Farm hosted barbecues in the 1980s and hayrides in the 1990s with a petting zoo including goats, pigs, and rabbits.

Bill cultivated from sixty to eighty acres of apples at the height of apple production, Al said. Then, he converted some land to grow blueberries, raspberries, peaches, pumpkins, and sunflowers.

"For his ninetieth birthday," offered Nancy, "Bill got a chainsaw to help with farm maintenance."

Al and Nancy expanded the retail business as they took over day-to-day operation. "You know," said Al, "agriculture

is inherently risky. If you're doing pick-your-own apples, people have to want to pick. We want our business to be sustainable, viable, and relevant. We have geothermal solar panels and wind turbines. Our employees live locally."

Al credited the late Pat Spaulding — "No relation," said Nancy of Spaulding Graphics in Athol with creating the Red Apple Farm logo. Also, he noted, Red Apple Farm had a website before IBM launched its corporate website in 1994.

In the earlier 2000s, diversification included weddings and a harvest fest. Although the farm no longer serves as a wedding venue, the harvest fest became the prototype for many events. Along with Easter's Great Gathering, and Enchanted Orchard Renaissance Faire, Red Apple farm will host Barkin' Summer Bash dates TBA in early June for dog lovers and their pets.



From Apples to Aces: Reinventing Gterling's Meadowbrook Orchards

ounded in 1912,
Meadowbrook
Orchards in Sterling
operates in the
third generation of
ownership. Dairying helped
support the fledgling orchard
for several years from 1912 until
a devastating fire destroyed the
animal herd and laying hens in
1927. The orchard then became
the sole enterprise of the farm.
Despite hardships and lean times,
Meadowbrook has continued

successfully through the years, even after the tragic hurricane of 1938.

Meadowbrook Orchards consists of a hundred acres with eighty acres in apples and berry crops. The orchard offers a pick-your-own option for those looking for outdoor, country fun.

Established in recent years, a bakery, restaurant, and farm store offer retail variety. An on-site restaurant features homemade breakfasts and lunches made with a variety of foods, including some grown

on the farm. The restaurant serves numerous daily specials year-round, Wednesday through Sunday, according to its website meadowbrookorchards.com.

Thursday evenings feature BBQ dinners in the summer months. Additionally, the orchard offers a fruit community-supported agriculture program, CSA, featuring their own apples, raspberries, and blueberries.

Faced with the increasing challenges of operating an orchard, Meadowbrook constructed a disc golf course in

2021. It integrates well with the orchard operation and provides a stable income to supplement production of apple and other crops. The course encompasses not only part of the orchard but also surrounding woodland. Beautiful vistas of the scenic North Central Massachusetts area highlight the course.

An outdoor sport with similarities to regular golf, disc golf uses a flying disc similar to a frisbee, although a little smaller, instead of a ball and clubs. Players throw a disc toward and eventually into a basket, if they score. The object of the game involves having the lowest number of throws to complete each hole.

Disc golf has developed quite a following over the past few years. The sport even experienced growth through the Covid era, since disc golf lends itself well to social distancing.

An afficionado can play disc golf alone, but usually in groups up to four or even to eight compete, although it works better for eight players to take part as two groups of four each. The hardiest of players pay little attention to cold weather and snow while taking part in the year-round sport.

Disc golf offers an opportunity for de-stressing, achieving harmony with the inner self, and aerobic exercise. The sport brings people together as friends regardless of diverse backgrounds or differing views of the world. In addition, disc golfers have tournaments that benefit cancer programs and other causes.

The website discgolfscene.com describes Meadowbrook as a "good mix of open and wooded holes in and around a scenic apple orchard." Meadowbrook offers glow golf, likely with glow-in-thedark discs, on Friday evenings in warm months.

Meadowbrook, an 18-hole, par 3 course, ranks second among Massachusetts disc golf courses by the UDisc app and 62 of more than 15,000 courses worldwide. A second course under construction at Meadowbrook will serve players of all levels but especially those less skilled or otherwise challenged.

Meadowbrook has hosted players from all fifty states, most of the Canadian provinces, and thirteen countries around the globe. Many players enjoy the proximity of other disc golf courses in central Massachusetts.

At Meadowbrook, disc golfers may partake of meals in the restaurant or foods from the bakery. They can shop at the farm store offering a wide variety of disc golf supplies including clothing.

Owner David Chandler said that Meadowbrook is unique as the only disc golf course in the area with a restaurant. Disc golf has greatly helped Meadowbrook Orchards become a stable enterprise at a time when many other orchards have become housing lots or plazas or have taken on other non-agricultural uses. His employees take pride in the establishment and warmly welcome visitors, he said.

Diverse North Central Massachusetts Waterfalls

Make Inviting Day Hike Destinations

Waterfalls in North Central Massachusetts flow with diversity and run deep in history. The area offers mountain peaks, hiking trails, paddling waterways, and, of course, scenic waterfalls. As a born-and-raised member of North Central Massachusetts and an explorer by nature, I enjoy the beauty of the region where we can immerse in nature right outside the door and a few steps down the trail.

Some favorite day hikes in North Central Massachusetts feature accessible waterfalls and perfect opportunities for families and other hikers to connect — with nature and with each other.

We have experienced droughts and unusually soggy weather at times resulting in high water levels and plentiful rapids due to all the rain. Explorers must always practice good judgment and take safety seriously near water sources.

Trap Falls Ashby

Set in the Willard Brook State Forest, hikers can reach the falls with a short stroll from the road over a wooden bridge in front of the falls. While some falls require a hike, the Trap Falls stop is quaint and extremely accessible.

The short and sweet journey to Trap Falls makes it ideal for small children and families. Picnic tables and a few charcoal grills on site draw crowds in the summer.

Length: 0.2 miles/Elevation
Gain: 19 feet
Route Type: out and back
Falls Height: 10 to 12-foot drop
Family Friendly Rating: 5/5

Royalston Falls Royalston

The last stretch of the New England Trail, northbound, overlaps with Tully Trail, and that's where to find Falls Brook Shelter. Approximately a quarter mile from the shelter while venturing southbound on Tully Trail, hikers will come on to the falls almost from behind them. Don't expect to be greeted head-on with a stunning view. Follow the trail along the stream to get a good look that's worth it.

With some moderate hills, the simple trail has a lot of rocks and some quite steep places.

Length: 2.7 miles
Elevation Gain: 554 feet
Route Type: out and back
Falls Height: 45-foot drop
Family Friendly Rating: 4/5

Spirit Falls Royalston

Hikers can access Spirit Falls by way of Jacobs Hill Reservation, also part of the Tully Trail. Hiking down to the falls is easier, but heading up the trail makes a good workout, eventually emerging through the canoe launch across from Tully Lake Campground.

Nearby, Jacob's Hill Overlook and the Ledges offer some beautiful sights as well. It might be challenging for little legs, but it's a great spot!

Length: 1.5 miles/Elevation Gain: 465 feet Route Type: out and back Falls Height: 150-foot drop Family Friendly Rating: 3/5

Doane's Falls Royalston

Doane's Falls qualifies as superb for ease of hiking and accessibility. A short walk from the parking area brings visitors to a view of the falls. It's handicap accessible, and it's so accessible that the visually impaired can enjoy sounds of rushing water right from the parking lot.

Length: 0.4 miles/Elevation Gain: 104 feet Route Type: out and back Falls Height: Approx. 175foot drop Family Friendly Rating: 5/5







A Lovely day in the Region

ne can travel across the North Central region of Massachusetts along forty miles of Route 2 in less than an hour going from, say, Ayer to Athol. But, unless it's important to reach a specific destination in as short a time as possible, why do it? North Central Massachusetts itself provides the destination for travelers seeking a relaxing, unhurried trip off the beaten path. The region lends itself well to the new slow-travel trend.

Here's a possible trip with some engaging stops. The traveler will likely find additional places to visit along the way, perhaps saving some for next time. Arriving in the area by Route 2 from the east, stop at the Johnny Appleseed Visitor Center on Route 2 westbound in Lancaster for some ideas of places to see.

Taking the Fitchburg exit from Route 2, a slow traveler and

companions may drive to Fitchburg to tour Fitchburg Art Museum. It makes a good visit for those less inclined to hiking or perhaps on a rainy day. Founded in 1925, FAM has set a goal of becoming the first area fully bilingual, English/Spanish, art museum. FAM has a section on ancient Egyptian art, standing exhibits of American photography and African art, as well as special shows dedicated to individual artists or techniques.

From Fitchburg, drive west on Route 2A with a possible meal stop at the Old Mill right off the highway on Route 140 south in Westminster. Driving further south on 140 and then west on Mile Hill Road brings the slow traveling traveler to Wachusett Mountain State Reservation in Princeton.

The reservation comprises the three-thousand-acre crown jewel of the area where travelers can look out in all directions. On a clear day, the visitor may see Boston to the east, Worcester to the south, Mount Greylock way out in the Berkshires to the west, and Mount Monadnock in Jaffrey, New Hampshire, to the north.

The Wachusett summit road is open from Memorial Day weekend until the end of October. Seventeen miles of walking trails include a section of the Midstate Trail. Wachusett Mountain Ski Area operates on part of the mountain, accessible by car.

Also in Princeton, find Redemption Rock, a Trustees of Reservations property. In 1676 during King Philip's War, Native American captors released Mary Rowlandson, wife of the first minister of Lancaster, from atop the notable granite ledge later named Redemption Rock. The adventurous person could reach Wachusett

Back on 2A, travelers may continue west while keeping an eye out for area antique and specialty shops as well as numerous greenhouses and nurseries that dot the region. Arriving in Athol, Route 32 south leads to Fisher Museum at Harvard Forest in Petersham. Home to well-known beautiful dioramas, Fisher Museum includes seven that depict the changing landscape of central Massachusetts starting at the time of European colonization. Outside, a

network of trails from short to lengthy beckon visitors into the research forest where they can explore and learn about the native habitat.

Returning to Athol, Route 32 north brings the slow traveler to Royalston, home to three Trustees of Reservations properties. A hike along a challenging trail down into a deep, ancient gorge reveals a 45-foot spectacular waterfall, Spirit Falls. Hiking through the 173-acre Jacobs Hill reservation through mixed species of forest in relative wilderness brings the hiker to Spirit Falls and also connects with 22-mile Tully Trail.

Also in Royalston, travelers find Doane's Falls, a short walk from Athol Road. The striking series of waterfalls captivate with photographic opportunities in all seasons. At the foot of Doane's Hill, travelers may decide to stay at Tully Lake Campground, operated by the Trustees as a tent-only camping adventure in a scenic and peaceful part of North Central Massachusetts.



lunch, the restaurant welcomes both dine-in guests and those preferring takeout. Its location makes it an ideal stop after exploring nearby conservation areas or enjoying outdoor activities along the Nashua River.

Shirley began serving food and drink in 1740 as a stop on the Boston to Albany stagecoach route. The restaurant offers seasonally available ingredients, many from area farms. Diners enjoy not only a well-prepared meal in a cozy atmosphere but top quality foods harvested nearby.

Kimball Farm, nearby Trustees of Reservations properties are just asking to be visited, including Fruitlands Museum in Harvard, Farandnear Reservation in Shirley, and Doyle Community Park in Leominster.

Roots Natural Foods in Leominster combines a natural food store with a welcoming café that specializes in organic, sustainable fare. The locally owned establishment's kitchen creates fresh smoothies, homemade soups, crisp salads, and hearty sandwiches for lunch. Their commitment to serving and selling responsibly farmed, organic, non-GMO, and local products makes it an ideal stop for health-conscious diners. The café's takeout options are perfect for those planning a picnic at nearby conservation areas or community parks.

New England Botanic Garden at Tower Hill in Boylston not only offers a wonderful collection of outdoor gardens, walking trails, and indoor conservatories but also dining at Farmer and the Fork, the onsite café offering locally sourced dishes.

Headed west for further sightseeing and exploring, travelers might stop to dine at **The Old Mill Restaurant in Westminster**, located in a former sawmill that began serving meals in a quaint, cozy atmosphere to the public in 1946. Visits to nearby state parks such as Wachusett Mountain State Reservation combine nicely with a meal before or after.

The region's numerous walking, hiking, and bike trails offer amazing views of the leaves in fall as well as all year long. More recently North Central Mass has also become home to some of the state's most popular amateur sports venues. Since its founding in 1994, Visit North Central Massachusetts has successfully branded the region and grown tourism's economic impact. The industry expanded dramatically from 2004 to 2023: jobs increased from 286 to over 4,300, while wages grew from \$2 million to \$117.3 million. Tourism's economic footprint also surged — from \$14.3 million in visitor spending in 2004 to over \$496.9 million in direct visitor spending and \$8.2 million in local tax revenues by 2023.

and agricultural events like the Johnny Appleseed Festival in Leominster and Applefest at Wachusett Mountain. It is the birthplace of Johnny Appleseed! In fact, Johnny's 250th birthday coincides with the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution. Born in Leominster, Johnny was an early conservationist who planted numerous orchards as settlers moved west helping to establish communities and a rugged crop for cider.

A "Cultural Revolution" is growing in North Central Massachusetts


North Central Massachusetts is home to some of the state's most iconic cultural attractions and is rich with historic and cultural assets. The region features cultural gems like Fitchburg Art Museum, the Icon Museum, Fort Devens Museum, Fruitland Museum and the NE Botanical Garden at Tower Hill and other small specialty museums and galleries which anchor the area's Cultural Revolution. More than a half dozen performing arts centers enrich the North Central Mass landscape - led by the world-class Groton Hill Music Center. Numerous town historical societies and robust libraries are also located through our region's 27 towns and communities. A culinary renaissance is also occurring with a variety of restaurants

featuring international cuisines and scores of food festivals and farmer's markets.

The "Manufacturing Revolution" had its roots in North Central Massachusetts

From the "Plastics Capital of the World" to "Toy Town" to "Chair City", North Central Massachusetts has a huge heritage as a manufacturing and industrial hub.

The region has a rich history in manufacturing, including the birthplace of the American plastics industry in Leominster. The area is home to more than 430 manufacturers. including dozens of multinational corporations. Companies range from the world class plastics industry cluster of more than 140 companies - the largest in the Northeast - to pharmaceuticals to photonics and paper, as well as biomedical devices. North Central Massachusetts is unique

among workforce areas in the state in that it has double the number of manufacturing jobs as a percentage of the private labor force. Fully one-third of all private wages paid in the region are from manufacturing jobs. From a flourishing comb industry to the invention of Tupperware and the creation of the Plastic Lawn Flamingo, Leominster molded itself into the Pioneer Plastics City. Gardner earned its seat in history as Chair City producing in excess 1.2 million chairs annually at its manufacturing peak. In addition to its reputation as Toy Town, Winchendon was home to the first successful wood thickness planer, invented by Baxter Whitney. Fitchburg's

manufacturing history spans a variety of industries over the years including steam engines, world class bicycles, firearms, and paper. Clinton's rich history as a mill town starting with the invention of the Bigelow Loom for carpets and heavy textiles. This is why we say that North Central Massachusetts is "Where Manufacturing Matters."

A "Business Revolution" is Booming in North Central Massachusetts!

A strong and stable business base exists here in North Central Massachusetts, as well as rapidly growing industrial/commercial areas such as Devens

Business Park. As home to the Devens Regional Enterprise Zone – our region features one of the only business development communities in the state. The Zone is a world-class destination for companies in leading industries like technology, advanced manufacturing and life sciences. The business revolution in North Central Massachusetts has been driven by innovation, strategic investments and an ability to adapt to shifting economic landscapes. Affordable real estate in the region makes it attractive for startups and entrepreneurs looking to establish roots. Institutions like Fitchburg State University and Mount Wachusett

Celebrating Community: The Evolution of GrotonFest

howcasing the town's vibrant local artisans, businesses, and community spirit, the GrotonFest family of events has become a cherished tradition. Over the past decade, the festivals have expanded from a single autumn gathering to three seasonal celebrations — fall, winter, and spring — bringing together thousands of residents and visitors.

A Brief History

GrotonFest began in 1979 as a fall festival and has recently celebrated its forty-fifth anniversary. The Groton Business Association, GBA, acquired the festival from Jane Bouvier in 2017, retaining the original coordinating team to maintain the festival's community-focused mission. GrotonFest expanded in 2022 to include a winter event and further broadened its offerings in 2024 with a spring festival.

In 2024 alone, more than twenty thousand people attended GrotonFest, thus underscoring the importance of the gatherings in fostering community connections, particularly in the wake of the pandemic.

Notable Locations and Sponsors: GrotonFest Fall

With sponsor banners prominently displayed, the

Laurence W. Gay American Legion Post 55 Hall anchors GrotonFest Fall. The red building, featured in many promotional photos, serves as a focal point for the festival. The event takes place in Legion Common and transforms the field into a lively marketplace of local vendors, artisans, and entertainers.

GrotonFest Winter

The winter festival takes place on the first Saturday of December at multiple locations, including the Groton Inn's Forge and Vine restaurant and the Prescott Community Center. Groton Public Library joined the lineup to offer additional vendor space and

The spring event occurs on the back lawn of Prescott Community Center and marks a celebratory transition into the warmer months. This festival, too, draws a significant crowd, contributing to the overall growth of GrotonFest.

On History

Jeff Gordon, GBA president, reflected, I actually grew up right on School Street, where GrotonFest Fall has been hosted for the majority of its forty-five years. I loved that every fall our whole community came together to showcase the businesses and artisans. I am honored to have been a part of it on a larger scale for almost ten years now.

On Growth

Lynne Burnmeister, event coordinator for GrotonFest Winter and Spring, noted the need for community connection postpandemic. "After COVID," she said, we felt the world was yearning for more opportunities to gather and celebrate. We saw a chance to enhance our businesses and fill the desire for family-friendly activities with two additional festivals. Dominique Henderson, entertainment

and marketing coordinator, echoed the sentiment.

"After COVID," he said we saw the desire from our community to support as many organizations as possible. With GrotonFest Winter expanding throughout downtown Groton, we encourage all Main Street businesses to have vendors, live music, food, and performances."

Looking Ahead

As GrotonFest enters its forty-fifth year, it remains a testament to the power of community and the joy of celebration, promising many more years of growth and connection for the town of Groton.
